Greetings from Albany Area Schools,

It has been an absolute pleasure to attempt to fill the large shoes of former Superintendent Greg Johnson. As your new superintendent, I have spent the greatest portion of my time over the past three months focused on meeting people, building relationships and learning all I can about who we are and how we do things. So far I have been able to gather a lot of information and am enjoying working with our administrative team to better understand where we might be able to focus our efforts for growth.

Albany Area Schools has a reputation that is well known outside our borders. Now, I have been able to experience the district and our community firsthand. This summer I was able to regularly attend meetings for both the Avon and Albany Chambers of Commerce. I was also able to meet local business leaders, attend Spunktacular Days and Heritage Days and even got a personal tour of Pioneer Days this fall. Another major development this summer was the referendum that voters approved on August 9. With 59% of our voters approving the \$16.9 million dollar project, we are now hard at work in the design phase of the project. We are very thankful to have such strong support for our school from our community and I am excited to be a part of this process. We look forward to bringing you regular updates as the project progresses.

It has been a wonderful start to the school year and I am looking forward to experiencing more Purple Pride throughout the year. Thank you for the opportunity to serve Albany Area Schools and thank you for your support of our district.



Referendum Update – Early Learning Center

Thanks to the voters of the Albany Area School District and a successful referendum on August 9, the vision for the Albany Area Schools Early Learning Center is now becoming a reality!


An interesting aspect of a major public project like our Early Learning Center is the amount of time that each step takes. However, we have still made some big strides since August 9. We have been working with ICS, our lead project consultant, to coordinate and manage the numerous aspects of the project. The Board of Education officially purchased the former Albany Hospital on September 13. We then updated our bond rating and collected bids for the bond sale,



and the Board of Education officially awarded the sale of bonds on October 12. We also established a Design Committee and Project Oversight Committee to develop the plan and implement the vision for the building. We officially close on the sale of the bonds on November 3 and will then have the funds to finance work on the project.

Design of the new Early Learning Center is expected to go on throughout the school year, but the goal is to complete the major design aspects by spring, when the project is tentatively scheduled to go out for competitive bid for all construction trades. Abatement and interior demolition will most likely take place during the design phase of the project, and major construction will begin sometime late next summer. Although supply chain issues and labor shortages have become a regular occurrence lately, we are still pushing for the building to be ready for students by the fall of 2024.

The new Albany Area Schools Early Learning Center will house all students who would normally attend preschool and kindergarten at Albany Elementary School. The new facility will free up 4 to 5 classrooms at both Avon and Albany Elementary Schools and will enable us to better accommodate some of our current program



needs. It will also provide room for future growth of our district and significantly improve our ability to provide high quality education to our learners and the districtwide community.

As the design and construction process continues, we are committed to sharing regular updates with our staff and community, and we are currently developing a plan for community engagement at all major milestones. We can't wait to share all the exciting developments as they happen.

Thank you to our entire community for helping to support the new Albany Area Schools Early Learning Center.

Happy Fall! I hope you have had a great start to the school year. This year, you will see updates from me in each edition of the Huskie Howl. I will share more about what we do at Albany Area Schools to ensure our students and staff have a safe learning environment and I will also share ways you can help support your student in safety-related topics at home.

At the beginning of the school year I received several calls and emails asking about our school safety measures. The heartbreaking events at Uvalde at the end of last school year brought forth many concerns for parents. School safety is always one of the top priorities for our district. Here are a just a few of the things we have in place to ensure student and staff safety throughout the day:

- Secured entrances and all doors locked during the school day
- Raptor visitor management system for all visitors and staff ID badges
- Lockdown/emergency drills
- ALICE training for staff and students
- CrisisGo App for staff during emergency situations
- Daily SRO safety walkthroughs

PAWS-ITIVE PRIDE

If you're a parent of a student at Albany or Avon Elementary, it's likely you've heard the term "Paws-itive Pride". Both elementary schools use PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) as a positive and proactive approach to student behaviors. Each school has pillars that guide student behaviors including: Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe and Be a Learner. In all areas of the school day, students are taught what it looks like to show Paws-itive Pride for each of these pillars. Students and classrooms are also celebrated when they are caught showing one of these positive behaviors. Throughout the year a variety of celebrations are held as the school works together to meet a goal. A few of these rewards are filling the Huskie House at Albany Elementary and the Tower of Pride at Avon Elementary.
